When you buy a firearm from a retailer, it's your responsibility to register it

When you buy a firearm from a retailer, they have info they need to complete. But, it's your responsibility to register your firearm in the Registry.

If this is the first time you have had an activating circumstance, you will also need to register ALL firearms and parts you already own into the Registry within 30 days.

Once you have provided information for the Registry, you must update it every time something changes. For example, when buying a firearm from a retailer or through private transaction.

Remember safety first if you're hunting in the National Wild Goat Hunting Competition this year

- Wherever you are hunting, make sure you have permission
- Chamber a cartridge only when you're ready to fire
- Supervise unlicensed firearms users
- Identify your target beyond all doubt

Police committed to preventing unlawful hunting

Police committed to preventing unlawful hunting

As spring approaches West Coast Police are urging the public to continue to report suspicious hunting activity.

Police had a great result in May where a member of the public reported a man walking beside State Highway 6 near Woodstock-Rimu Road at around 10.30pm. Police attended to find a man with a fresh deer carcass.

After speaking with the man, follow up enquiries led Police to his vehicle where a hunting rifle and thermal scope were seized.

The man later admitted to unlawfully shooting the wild deer on the side of the road.

We have had more than **266,916** firearms registered since the Registry has been live.

Remember, the first time you have an activating circumstance you are required to record all arms items in your possession.

Firearms licensing data

Firearms licensing performance

Te Tari Pūreke is working to complete all firearms licence applications within three months (90 days).

However, it should be recognised that in some situations it will take longer than three months to arrange with applicants and complete parts of the process. Here is the latest firearms licencing performance data broken down by region.
